

Summary for Presentation

John S. Skinner, PhD

Total Hip Replacement: The View from 30,000 Feet

Get a better understanding of the macro-level characteristics of surgical utilization and Medicare financing in the United States, with particular emphasis on total hip replacement.

During the past decade, the rate of total hip replacements has risen while the real inflation-adjusted Medicare price for the procedure has fallen. How are these two trends related and what can be expected in the future? Second, do rates of total hip replacements and revisions, as well as complications following surgery, vary across regions and socioeconomic groups? For example, age-sex-race adjusted rates of total hip replacement in the Medicare population are as high as 5.4 per thousand in Provo, Utah, and as low as 1.8 per thousand in New Orleans. Making sense of these regional patterns is important both clinically and for macro-level Medicare policy.

David Lovett, AAOS Director, Washington, DC

Presentation: "Washington Update"

David A. Lovett, JD, is the Director of the Washington Office of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons. He joined the AAOS in 1992, and currently represents the interests of the Academy before Congress, the Administration, and regulatory agencies.

In 1991-1992, he was Legal Counsel for the Institute for Socio-Financial Studies, a non-profit corporation created to study the impact of financial and tax policy on various social groupings. Major issues included how monetary policies affect access to health care and insurance.

A native of Chicago, he served as Legislative Director for Congressman Frank Annunzio from 1982 to 1990. He managed all legislative operations, including those emphasizing long-term, nursing home, and catastrophic health care coverage.

A magna cum laude graduate of Brandeis University in 1978, he received his J.D. from Northwestern University School of Law in 1981. His updates are very interesting and timely—don't miss this important update.
